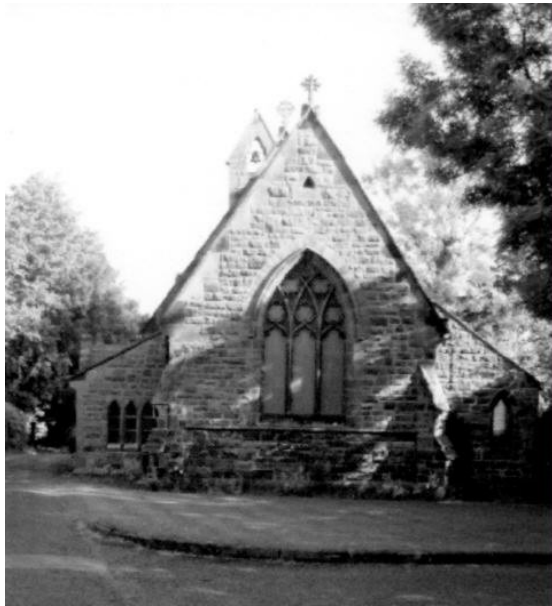


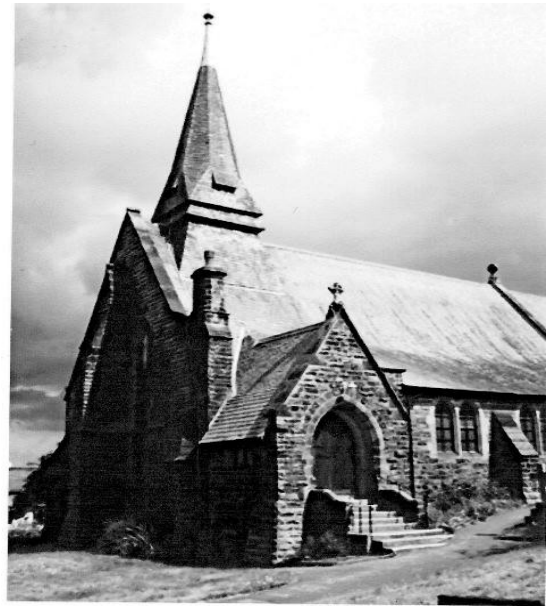

This month we introduce you to Jennifer Southern from St Paul's Church.

Jennifer was born in a Lancashire village and has a younger brother Philip. Jennifer went to the local primary school and then on to the Secondary Modern school in the nearby town. She did well, excelling in the Sciences, especially Biology

With this as a background Jennifer went on to study Pharmacy at University and completed her (pre-registration) training at Aintree Hospital before sitting and passing her Registration exams to become a member of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain.

Outside of school, Jennifer went to Sunday School and was entered into Bible Recitation Competitions which she won on two occasions. These were carried out in a large hall and with no microphone so maybe this is how Jennifer, a shy child, ended up with a loud voice which projects well!

Jennifer enjoyed going to the Brownies and Girl Guides and is very thankful to her leaders who made this such an active group of Girl Guides and gave her so many opportunities to try new things like abseiling and canoeing.

Her first holiday abroad was to Sweden with her Guide unit when she was 13 years old. They went to the North of Sweden and had a marvellous time in the mountains and lakes and she is still in contact with the girl she stayed with in 'Home Hospitality' and so are the families. Guiding also allowed her to attend the World Scout Jamboree in Korea, and to go onto Japan, another fantastic opportunity which led to much more travelling. Jennifer loves travelling and visiting other countries. She has travelled all over the world including Botswana; Borneo; Ecuador and the Galapagos Islands; Peru; Costa Rica; China; Hong Kong; Russia; Egypt; Australia; New Zealand; Fiji as well as Europe – although she has never been to France (apart from a day-trip to Calais!)

Her uncle was a 'Tower Captain' and through him Jennifer learnt to bell ring when she was 10 years old, and although she hasn't kept ringing up all her life she does now ring at St Lawrence's Church in Frodsham. Jennifer would recommend anyone to take up bell ringing as it's fun and sociable and does not require any particular skill. She adds that you have to try it in order to know whether you will be any good at it. She admits that she is not that good herself but she is always made very welcome by the other ringers!

When not bell ringing and travelling abroad, Jennifer's other hobbies are gardening; craft and walking.

Jennifer has lived in Helsby for more than 10 years. She used to go to church in Frodsham and has been attending St Paul's Church for the past five years having gone to church all her life.

Jennifer says she took her Confirmation very seriously and that she didn't feel that she was ready at the age of 13 years to make such a major decision and so she delayed being confirmed until she was 17 years old. This was the age at which she felt able to commit to the promises she made at her confirmation which took place at the Liverpool Anglican cathedral.

## **The Philippines – a personal view (V)**

Unemployment in the Philippines is very high, and so, as there is no dole or benefits system, nine million or so Filipinos work abroad and send money home to support their families. This 'export' of labour is essential to the Philippines economy. Every flight I have been on from Europe or the Middle East to Manila has been absolutely full, and 90 to 95 per cent of the passengers have been Filipino overseas workers going on their once a year trip back home to see their children and families. The children of each family are brought up by the husband or wife who has stayed at home, or by an aunt or grandmother.

One such overseas worker is Rebecca, who occupied the adjacent seat on my flight from Amsterdam to Manila. She works in a care home in Kent and was returning home to see her husband and daughter. She told me she has a brother who's wish is to meet an Englishman of a similar inclination and enter into a civil partnership and come over to live in England. I said I was sorry but I was not able to help her!!

On a flight from Dubai to Manila, a Filipino man told me he went home every year to see his wife and their three month old child!

When I was in the Philippines last year the newspapers told of the homecoming of 75 year old Irene Santo Domingo. She had gone to Saudi Arabia in the early 1980's to work as a seamstress in order to support her six children. In the year 2000 her employers stopped paying her wages. She had no choice but to leave and seek work elsewhere.

Because she had left her employer she did not have her passport or proper documentation and therefore any work she got was illegal. She was an 'outlaw', and so had to keep moving from one employer to the next to stay one step ahead of the Saudi police. She did this for ten years until she fell ill. Her plight came to the attention of the Philippine Overseas Workers Welfare Administration who negotiated her return home to Manila and to her family.

In October last year the Philippine authorities issued a blacklist of forty one countries which, they say, do not adequately protect foreign workers. This ban follows persistent reports of workers, particularly maids, being abused by the employers.

The Philippines was formed by earthquake and volcanic activity. There have been major earthquakes in 1863, 1880 and, most recently, in July 1990 when 1700 people lost their lives. The Philippines lies on the same fault line as the earthquake that occurred in Japan and which caused that devastating tsunami. This had happened just two weeks before my visit last year and the authorities were concerned that there could be subsequent earthquakes in the Philippines and several public buildings thought to be at most risk were closed.

The Philippines has 56 volcanoes, 18 of which are considered to be active. Mount Mayon is a perfectly conical volcano, similar to Mount Fuji in Japan, though not as high. It regularly spews molten lava down the mountainside to the consternation of the villagers below. Mount Taal is a spectacular volcano, not because of its height – it is one of the world's lowest volcanoes – but because of its setting. It has a lake in its crater; Mount Taal itself rises from the lake which is in the crater of a much larger, and extinct volcano. Almost every time I have been to Manila there has been an expectation that Mount Taal is about to erupt again – but it hasn't.

Mount Banahaw is another extinct volcano. It is sacred to several religious sects who believe that Christ lived, died, and was resurrected here. They believe that seven angels transported Calvary from the Holy Land to Mount Banahaw. This is also the place where the righteous will brave the last floods on Earth. However, given that Mount Banahaw at 7175 feet is not the highest mountain in the Philippines there might be better places to be when the waters start to rise – but it sure beats Snowdon or Ben Nevis!

The Americans had an Air base at Clark Field, near to Angeles City, and a Naval Base at Subic Bay close to Olongapo. The economy of both these places benefitted greatly by their proximity to the bases. The bases provided many facilities for the entertainment of the troops and facilitated the enrichment of the more accommodating of the local women.

Nevertheless, the leases on the bases were due to run out in 1991 and the Philippine authorities had said that they would not renew them. The Americans were dragging their heels hoping to stay on for longer. Mount Pinotubo which had been dormant for 600 years suddenly erupted, dumping volcanic ash several metres deep on both the bases and the local countryside. The Americans decided it was time to go – leaving the Philipinos to clear up the mess.

However, it is typhoons and not earthquakes or volcanoes which cause most havoc for the people – a typhoon is the Philippine equivalent of a hurricane. Typhoon Nesat in October last year killed 43 people, damaged the homes of 160,000 more , and destroyed the rice harvest. In December Typhoon Washi caused flooding and landslides in the Southern Island of Mindanao causing well over 1000 deaths. Whilst the consequences of typhoons might be termed 'natural disasters' they are often made worse by logging, both legal and illegal, and corruption is frequently behind the illegal logging !
